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Important Safety Information

Important safety instructions

When using your telephone equipment, basic safety precautions should always be followed to reduce the risk of fire, electric shock and injury, including the following:

- 1. This product should be installed by a qualified technician.
- 2. This product should only be connected to the host equipment and never directly to the network such as Public Switch Telephone Network (PSTN) or Plain Old Telephone Services (POTS).
- 3. Read and understand all instructions.
- 4. Follow all warnings and instructions marked on the product.
- 5. Unplug this product from the wall outlet before cleaning. Do not use liquid or aerosol cleaners. Use a damp cloth for cleaning.
- 6. Do not use this product near water such as near a bath tub, wash bowl, kitchen sink, laundry tub or swimming pool, or in a wet basement or shower.
- 7. Do not place this product on an unstable table, shelf, stand or other unstable surfaces.
- 8. Slots and openings in the back or bottom of the handset are provided for ventilation. To protect them from overheating, these openings must not be blocked by placing the product on a soft surface such as a bed, sofa or rug. This product should never be placed near or over a radiator or heat register. This product should not be placed in any area where proper ventilation is not provided.
- 9. This product should be operated only from the type of power source indicated on the marking label. If you are not sure of the type of power supplied at the premises, consult your dealer or local power company.
- 10. Do not allow anything to rest on the power cord. Do not install this product where the cord may be walked on.
- 11. Never push objects of any kind into this product through the slots in the handset because they may touch dangerous voltage points or create a short circuit. Never spill liquid of any kind on the product.
- 12. To reduce the risk of electric shock, do not disassemble this product, but take it to an authorized service facility. Opening or removing parts of the base station or handset other than specified access doors may expose you to dangerous voltages or other risks. Incorrect reassembling can cause electric shock when the product is subsequently used.
- 13. Do not overload wall outlets and extension cords.

- 14. Unplug this product from the wall outlet and refer servicing to an authorized service facility under the following conditions:
 - A. When the power supply cord or plug is damaged or frayed.
 - B. If liquid has been spilled onto the product.
 - C. If the product has been exposed to rain or water.
 - D. If the product does not operate normally by following the operating instructions. Adjust only those controls that are covered by the operation instructions. Improper adjustment of other controls may result in damage and often requires extensive work by an authorized technician to restore the product to normal operation.
 - E. If the product has been dropped and the telephone base and/or handset has been damaged.
 - F. If the product exhibits a distinct change in performance.
- 15. Avoid using a telephone (other than cordless) during an electrical storm. There is a remote risk of electric shock from lightning.
- 16. Do not use the telephone to report a gas leak in the vicinity of the leak. Under certain circumstances, a spark may be created when the adapter is plugged into the power outlet, or when the handset is replaced in its cradle. This is a common event associated with the closing of any electrical circuit. The user should not plug the phone into a power outlet, and should not put a charged handset into the cradle, if the phone is located in an environment containing concentrations of flammable or flame-supporting gases, unless there is adequate ventilation. A spark in such an environment could create a fire or explosion. Such environments might include: medical use of oxygen without adequate ventilation; industrial gases (cleaning solvents; gasoline vapors; etc.); a leak of natural gas; etc.
- 17. Only put the handset of your telephone next to your ear when it is in normal talk mode.
- 18. The power adapters are intended to be correctly oriented in a vertical or floor mount position. The prongs are not designed to hold the plug in place if it is plugged into a ceiling, under-the-table or cabinet outlet.
- 19. Use only the power cord indicated in this manual.
- 20. For pluggable equipment, the socket-outlet shall be installed near the equipment and shall be easily accessible.
- 21. In wall mounting position, make sure to mount the telephone base on the wall by aligning the eyelets with the mounting studs of the wall plate. Then slide the telephone base down on both mounting studs until it locks into place. Mount the device only at heights not exceeding 2 meters. Refer to the full installation instructions in "Handset Installation" on page 17-21 in this User Manual.
- 22. CAUTION: Keep small metallic objects such as pins and staples away from the handset receiver.
- 23. WARNING: The product included (ITE) in this manual is to be connected only to PoE networks without routing to the outside plant.

Product overview

The M55 SIP DECT Handset, combined with the M500 Multi-cell SIP DECT Base Station, is a full-featured SIP endpoint business phone system designed to work with popular hosted IP PBX services and on-premise SIP PBXs. Once you have ordered and configured your PBX service, the handset enables you to make and receive calls as you would with any other business phone.

Up to eight M55 handsets/M58 desksets can be registered per M500 base station. The initial release of the M500 will support two M500 base stations connected in dual-cell operation, but subsequent firmware releases will support additional M500 base stations connected in multi-cell operation. Each handset provides calling features such as hold, transfer, conferencing, and speakerphone.


The M500 Multi-cell SIP DECT Base Station supports shared calls among multiple cordless handsets/desksets with a single SIP account. With Shared Call Emulation, the Programmable Feature Keys (PFKs) can be configured as KeyLine type, which enables the keys to be used as for making calls, picking up held calls, and barging in calls.


Factory Default Programmable Feature Key (PFK) Settings

Your handsets have a factory default configuration where the PFKs (1 to 4) are set up to handle calls on a shared line.

- All handset users can use the shared line via the PFKs.
- The LEDs on the PFKs will be on or flashing to indicate calls in progress across all handsets/desksets.
- A handset user can make a new call, pick up a held shared call, or barge in a shared call by pressing the PFKs.



Please note that the PFKs may be configured differently on your phone system. For example, a PFK might be used for a private line, to turn DND on/off, etc. To see how the PFKs are configured on your handset, press **PFK 1-6** on the idle screen.





Handset Installation

This section assumes that your network infrastructure is established and that your IP PBX phone service has been ordered and configured for your location.

Handset installation involves both the handset and the handset charger. The charger is powered using the supplied power adapter. The charger can be placed on a flat surface or mounted on a wall.


Avoid placing the handset and charger too close to:

- Communication devices such as television sets, DVD players, or other cordless telephones
- Excessive heat sources
- Noise sources such as a window with traffic outside, motors, microwave ovens, refrigerators, or fluorescent lighting
- Excessive dust sources such as a workshop or garage
- Excessive moisture
- Extremely low temperature
- Mechanical vibration or shock such as on top of a washing machine or work bench

Installing the charger

Install the charger as shown below.

Plug the power adapter into an electrical outlet not controlled by a wall switch.

- 2. The power adapter is intended to be correctly oriented in a vertical or floor mount position. The prongs are not designed to hold the plug in place if it is plugged into a ceiling, under-the-table or cabinet outlet.

Battery installation and charging


Install the battery as shown on the following page. Once you have installed the battery, the screen indicates the battery status (see the table below). If necessary, place the handset in the charger to charge the battery. For best performance, keep the handset in the charger when not in use. The battery is fully charged after 11 hours of continuous charging.


If the screen is blank, you need to charge the handset without interruption for at least 30 minutes to give the handset enough charge to use the telephone for a short time. When the battery is low, the handset shows a flashing Very low battery icon or Low battery icon.

Battery indicators	Battery Status	Action
The screen is blank or Very low battery icon flashes.	The battery has no or little charge. The handset cannot be used.	Charge without interruption (at least 30 minutes).
Low battery icon flashes.	Battery has enough charge to be used for a short time.	Charge without interruption (at least 30 minutes).
Full battery icon papears.	Battery is charged.	To keep the battery charged, place it in the charger when not in use.

To install the handset battery:

- 1. Place the top of the battery in the handset battery compartment so that the battery connectors are aligned.
- 2. Push the bottom of the battery down into the battery compartment.
- 3. Align the cover flat against the battery compartment, then slide it upwards until it clicks into place.







4. Charge the handset by placing it face forward in the charger. The battery icon indicates the charge status as the battery charges.

Very low battery. Charging less than 30 minutes.
Charging less than 30 minutes.
Charging 30 to 80 minutes.
Charging 80 minutes to 7 hours.
Charging more than 7 hours. Fully charged at 11 hours.


- Use only the supplied rechargeable battery or replacement battery (model number 503860AR1500). To order a replacement battery, visit our website at **www.snomamericas.com**.
- If you do not use the handset for a long time, disconnect and remove the battery to prevent possible leakage.

Wall mounting the charger

The charger is ready for tabletop use. If you want to mount the charger on a wall, use two 19 mm (3/4 inch) screws and wall anchors to hold the charger in place. Screws and wall anchors are not provided, but are available for purchase at hardware retailers. You might need a professional to install the charger.

To mount the charger on the wall:

1. Use a pencil to mark the desired positions of the two holes on the wall. Make sure the space between the two holes is 34 mm (1 5/16 inches). Drill two holes in the wall according to the marks.



Mount the device only at heights not exceeding 2 meters (79 inches).

- 2. If you drill the holes into a stud, go to step 3.
 - -OR-

If you drill the holes into an object other than a stud, insert the wall anchors (not provided) into the holes and tap gently on the ends with a hammer until the wall anchors are flush with the wall.

- Insert the screws into the holes and tighten them until only 6 mm (1/4 inch) of the screws are exposed.
- 4. Align the holes at the back of the charger with the screws on the wall and slide the charger down until it locks into place.



Adding a corded headset

You can use this handset hands-free when you install any industry-standard 3.5 mm corded telephone headset (purchased separately).



To connect a Bluetooth headset to your handset, refer to the instructions in "Connecting a Bluetooth Headset" on page 59.

Handset Registration

The handset must be registered to the base station in order to make and receive calls.

When you power up the handset for the first time, it will attempt to auto-register to the base station. Auto-registration will be successful only if you have set up the M500 configuration file with the handset IPEI, or you have entered the IPEI on the Primary base station's WebUI.

Auto-registering the handset to the base station

- 1. Make sure the base station is connected to power and the network.
- 2. If the handset is displaying the following screen:



- a. Wait for the handset to auto-register.
- b. If the IPEI has not been set up in the configuration file (provisioned), or the auto-registration is taking too long, press Cancel.
- 3. If the handset is displaying the following screen:



- a. Press Reg.
 The handset displays the "Register via" menu.
- b. Press or to scroll to Auto reg or IPEI input, and press Sel.
- c. Wait for the handset to auto-register.







Using the Handset

This section describes how to use the handset to make calls and answer calls. This section also describes how to put calls on hold, transfer calls, and create conference calls.

Idle screen

The Idle screen appears after the phone is connected and configured for your SIP PBX service. The Idle screen indicates that you have no active or held calls.

From the Idle screen, you can press:

- Call list to view the Call List.
 See "Displaying calls on the Call List" on page 46.
- **Line** to select another account (SIP Account).

 When you make a call, the phone will use this account. See "If you wish to choose a dialing line (account) for the outside call:" on page 34.
- MENU/Confirm key to view the main menu see "Main Menu" on page 33.

Password warning on the Idle screen

The idle screen will display a warning message if the Administrator Password and/or User Password has not been set. While this warning message is displayed, the **Call List** soft key is replaced by the **Info** soft key.





To restore the Call List soft key while the password warning is displayed:


- 1. Press Info.
 - A pop-up message appears.
- 2. Press .
- 3. Repeat steps 1-2.

The **Call List** soft key is now available.

After two minutes, the password warning message reappears and the **Call List** soft key is again replaced by the **Info** soft key.

To permanently clear the password warning from the Idle screen:

Making calls

You can make calls to any phone number (an outside call), or you can call another handset (an intercom call).

To make an outside call:

- 1. Use the keypad to enter the desired number.
 - Press **Del.** if you enter an incorrect digit.
- 2. Call the number by pressing **Dial**, (1) or an idle PFK (assigned as a shared line key).

When the call is answered, the active call screen appears.



NOTE: The call screen shows the following icons:

- 1 icon indicates the call occupies PFK 1.
- Li icon indicates shared call index number 1 is assigned to this shared call. This icon is not shown for private calls.

You can also live dial a number by pressing or an idle PFK (assigned as a shared line key) to go off hook before entering a phone number on the keypad.

If you wish to choose a dialing line (account) for the outside call:

- Press Line.
- 2. Press \wedge or \vee to select the dialing line (account).
- Press Enter.
- 4. Use the keypad to enter the desired number, and then press Dial.

To make an outside call using speed dial:

Press and hold the keypad number key (0-9) that matches the speed dial number.

NOTE: If the Speed Dial screen appears instead, it means the speed dial number has not been programmed. See "Setting Speed Dial entries" on Speed dial

page 67.

To make an intercom call to another handset or deskset:

1. Press the programmable key on the right side of the phone (below the volume keys), and then press **INT**.

Press the **MENU/Confirm** key, press \checkmark to select $\boxed{}$ (Intercom Call), then press **OK**.

2. Press \wedge or \vee to select the handset you wish to call, then press **Dial**.



Answering calls

When there is an incoming call, the handset rings and displays the Incoming call screen.

To answer a call:

Press Ans, I(I) or the green flashing PFK (assigned as a shared line key):



To answer an intercom call from another handset or deskset:

Press Ans.



To mute the ringer:

Press Mute.

The incoming call still appears on your handset display until you answer or reject the call.

If the incoming call is on a shared line, it still appears on your handset display until it is answered by a handset/deskset or rejected by all handsets/desksets.

To reject a call:

Press Reject.

If the call is on a shared line, the rejected call will continue to ring on other handset/desksets until it is answered or rejected by all handsets/desksets. Your handset will not ring again for the rejected call.

Answering multiple incoming calls

If you have multiple incoming calls, (as indicated by igoplus):



- Press \wedge or \vee to select the call you want to answer and press Ans.
 - -0R-

Press the green flashing PFK (assigned as a shared line key) for the call you want to answer.



You can choose to answer, mute, or reject this call - see "Call Waiting" on page 38 for more details.

Ending a call

To end a call:

Press or place the handset in the charger.

Volume

To adjust the listening volume during a call:

Press **VOLUME** - or + on the side of the handset.

Mute

The mute function enables you to hear the other party, but the other party cannot hear you.

To mute your handset's microphone during a call:

Press Mute.

When your handset's microphone is muted, the handset displays the mute icon at the top of the screen.

To unmute your handset's microphone during a call:

Press Unmute.

Speakerphone

To turn the speakerphone on/off during a call:

Press \P) to switch between speakerphone and normal handset use. When the speakerphone is active, the handset displays the speakerphone icon at the top of the screen, and the key is illuminated.

Corded Headset

When the corded headset is active during a call, the handset displays the headset icon

at the top of the screen.



Bluetooth headset

To switch audio to your Bluetooth headset during a call:

Press the soft key with your Bluetooth headset name.

To switch audio back to the speakerphone:

Press USE SPK.

Call Waiting

If you are on a call, and receive an incoming call from an outside number, the handset displays the Call Waiting screen. If you answer the call, your active call will be put on hold.

To answer the incoming call:

Press Ans.

To ignore the incoming call:

Press Ignore.

If the call is on a shared line, the ignored call will continue to ring on other handset/desksets until it is answered by a handset/deskset or rejected by all handsets/desksets.

The \bigoplus symbol indicates you can press \wedge or \vee to switch back to the "Call waiting" screen, where you can still answer or reject the ignored call.

If you end your active call or put it on hold, the ignored call will ring on your handset again.


To reject the incoming call:

- 1. Press Reject.
- 2. Press Yes on the confirmation screen.

If the call is on a shared line, the rejected call will continue to ring on other handset/desksets until it is answered by a handset/deskset or rejected by all handsets/desksets. Your handset will not ring again for the rejected call.

Missed Calls


If you don't respond to an incoming outside call, the handset displays a missed call alert on the idle screen.





Putting a call on hold

You can put an outside call on hold by pressing **Hold**. The handset also puts calls on hold automatically when you answer another call, transfer a call, or create a conference. Note that you cannot put an intercom call on hold.



To take the call off hold:

1. Press Call List.

NOTE: If the **Info** soft key label is shown instead of **Call List**, follow the steps in "To restore the Call List soft key while the password warning is displayed:" on page 32, then press **Call List** and continue to step 2 below.

2. If you have multiple calls on hold, press or ✓ to select the call you want to take off hold.

Press Resume.

If another party puts you on hold, you may see the message **Held by far end**. This message depends on compatibility between phones and PBX types, and may not always appear. You can press **End** to end the call.

To make a new call while on hold:

Putting a call on private hold

You can put a shared call on "private hold" to prevent any non-system phones (not M55 or M58) from resuming the held call shared across many SIP devices.

To put a shared call on private hold:

Press and hold the Hold soft key.

To take the call off private hold:

Press Call List.


NOTE: If the **Info** soft key label is shown instead of **Call List**, follow the steps in "To restore the Call List soft key while the password warning is displayed:" on page 32, then press **Call List** and continue to step 2 below.

- 2. If you have multiple calls on hold, press or ✓ to select the call you want to take off hold.
- Press Resume.

Switching between two calls

If you are managing two calls, you can switch between them by one of the following ways:

 Press the red flashing PFK (assigned as a shared line key) of the call you want to pick up

- 2. Press \checkmark to scroll to **Call list**, and then press **Select**.
- 3. Press Resume.



Paging a group of handsets/desksets

You can page a group of handsets/desksets, and send one-way audio. The receiving handsets/desksets in the group will play an alert tone, and your voice. The receiving handsets/desksets will play the audio as defined in their Auto ans audio settings (see "Setting Auto ans audio" on page 66).

You cannot hear the people you are paging. If you want to have a two-way conversation with a person, make an intercom call instead. For more information, see page 35.

In order for the page to work, the receiving handsets/desksets in the paging group must be idle. Paging groups are defined by your system administrator.

To page a handset/deskset:

- Press the programmable key on the right side of the phone (below the volume keys)
 - -0R-

Press the MENU/Confirm key, press to select (Interconcell), then press OK. Press Paging.

Press or to select a paging group, and press Page.

- Press or to select a paging group, and press Page.
 Your handset displays "Setting up. Please wait for the tone."
 When a connection is established, your handset plays a tone and displays "Broadcasting" with a timer.
- 3. Speak into your handset.
- 4. To end the page, press **End** or , or place the handset in the charger.

A receiving handset/deskset will not receive the page if:

- It is on an active call.
- It is off-hook (deskset)

Receiving a page

If you receive a page, your handset will play an alert tone and display the message "Paging: Incoming page."

When the connection is established, your handset displays "Broadcasting" with a timer, and you will hear the person paging you. The other person cannot hear you.

To end the page:

Press End or , or place the handset in the charger.

About Shared Calls

A shared line is a line (SIP account) that is configured with account type "Key Line Emulation". A shared line is assigned to more than one handset/deskset within the M500 system. A shared call is an incoming call on a shared line that can be seen and answered by any handset/deskset assigned with the shared line.

A private line is a line (SIP account) that is configured with account type "Standard". A private line is usually assigned to only one handset/deskset in the M500 system, but it can be mapped to more than one handset/deskset. A private call is an incoming call that can only be seen and answered by the handset(s)/deskset(s) assigned with the private line. Once a private call is answered, it is not visible in the Call List to other handsets/desksets that are assigned with the private line.

Active and held shared calls are shown in the Call List. Private calls are only shown in the Call List of the handset/deskset that makes or answers the call. For more information, see "Displaying calls on the Call List" on page 46.

The examples on page 44 and 45 show how to use the Call List to pick up a held shared call, and barge in an active shared call. Each example shows what the screen looks like on two different handsets. In these examples, the handsets are assumed to be configured to their factory default setting with PFKs (1 to 4) set up to handle calls on a shared line.



Displaying calls on the Call List

The Call List enables you to manage your own private calls and shared calls within the system. The Call List displays:

- Shared calls on other handsets/desksets, which can be active, held, or barged-in calls.
- Calls held by your handset whether shared or private.



To view the Call List:

1. If your handset is idle, press **Call List**.


NOTE: If the **Info** soft key label is shown instead of **Call List**, follow the steps in "To restore the Call List soft key while the password warning is displayed:" on page 32, then press **Call List** and continue to step 2 below.

-0R-

If your handset is on an active call, press the **MENU/Confirm** key, then press **V** to scroll down to **Call List** and press **Select**.

- 2. If there are multiple calls in the Call List, press ∧ or ∨ to select a call.
- To display more details about the call, press Info.
 Press or ✓ to scroll through the other calls in the Call List.





- 4. To retrieve a call on hold, press **Resume**.
- 5. To "barge in" on a shared call, press **Barge**.
- 6. To exit the Call List, press Back.

Barging In

You can "barge in" on a shared call in progress on another handset/deskset that shares the account. Barging in establishes a three-way call with two internal parties. Only one barge in party is allowed per active call.

To barge in on a call:

- Press the steady red PFK (assigned as a shared line key) of the call you want to barge in.
 - -0R-
- Press Call List to display the Call List.

NOTE: If the **Info** soft key label is shown instead of **Call List**, follow the steps in "To restore the Call List soft key while the password warning is displayed:" on page 32, then press **Call List** and continue to step 2 below.

- 3. Press Barge.

Note: The barged call cannot be placed on hold. Only a conference call with two external parties can be placed on hold.

Call Privacy

During an active shared call, you can turn on Call privacy in order to prevent other handsets/desksets from barging in.

If Call privacy is on and your put your call on hold, then your handset resets Barge-in to "Allowed". When you resume the call, other handsets/desksets will be able to barge in your call from the Call list.

To turn call privacy on/off during an active shared call:

- 1. Press the **MENU/Confirm** key.
- 2. Press \wedge or \vee to scroll to **Call privacy** and press **Select**.
- 3. Press or to select Barge-in as **Disallowed** or **Allowed**, then press **Set**.

When Barge-in is disallowed, your handset's call screen shows "Private."

When Barge-in is allowed, your handset's call screen shows "On a call."






Using Shared Call Emulation

Your phone is equipped with Shared Call Emulation, where up to six Programmable Feature Keys (PFKs) enable direct interaction with shared calls.

The PFKs act like shortcuts to the calls in the Call List.

Shared Call Emulation can be useful for small businesses where incoming calls are answered by a group of people. Handset users can use the PFKs to make new calls, answer incoming calls, pick up calls held by other users, or barge in other users' calls.




The examples on page 49 and 50 show how to use the PFKs to pick up a held shared call, and barge in an active shared call. Each example shows what the screen and PFK LEDs look like on two different handsets. In these examples, the handsets are assumed to be configured to their factory default setting with PFKs (1 to 4) set up to handle calls on a shared line.

For Shared Call Emulation, the LEDs on the PFKs indicate the status of calls:

PFK LED	Indicates:	Press the PFK to:
Off	Line is idle	Make a call
Quickly flashing green	Ringing incoming call	Answer the call
Steady green	Call is active on your handset	Put the call on hold
Slowly flashing green	Call is active on your handset, but the far end has put the call on hold	N/A
Slowly flashing red	Call is on hold	Retrieve the held call
Steady red	Shared call is active on another handset/deskset	"Barge in" on the shared call

Please note that if a PFK is defined with a different function (such as Do Not Disturb or Call Forwarding), the PFK LED indication will be different.



Transferring a call

You can transfer an external call to another party. While you are making the transfer, your call is automatically put on hold. There are three types of transfers:

- Blind transfer (default) Transfer the call immediately without talking to the transfer destination.
- Announced transfer Talk to the transfer destination before transferring the call.
- **Early attended transfer** Transfer the call while the transfer destination's phone is ringing.

You can also transfer a call to a held call. Note that you cannot transfer intercom calls.

To transfer a call:

During a call, press Xfer.

-0R-

Press the **MENU/Confirm** key, then press \checkmark to scroll to **Transfer** and press **Select**.



To make a Blind transfer:

Setting up a conference call

You can set up a conference call between yourself and two other parties.

To set up a conference call with an outside number:

- 1. During a call, press the **MENU/Confirm** key.
- Press ✓ to scroll to Conference and press Select.
 Your call is automatically put on hold.



3. Enter the number of the other party you want to join the conference and press **Dial.**



Putting a conference call on hold

Note: Barged calls cannot be placed on hold. Only a conference call with two external parties can be placed on hold.




When you have new messages, the message LED flashes on your handset and the idle screen displays a new messages notification:



To listen to your messages:



Locking the keypad



Setting call waiting



To view the line status of your handset:

- 3. Press \wedge or \vee to scroll through the information about the line.

Setting the language

- 4. With **Language** highlighted, press **Enter**.

- 6. Press **Set** to save, or press **Back** to cancel.



Setting the display options

You can configure the display options on the handset screen – backlight, screensaver, power save timeout, wallpaper and display theme.

To change the display options:

- 1. Press the **MENU/Confirm** key.
- 2. Press \checkmark and \gt to select \bigcirc (Settings), then press **OK**.
- 3. Press ∧ or ∨ to scroll to **User settings**, and press **Enter**.
- 4. Press ∧ or ∨ to scroll to **Display**, and press **Enter**.
- Press or ✓ to select a display option:
 - Backlight On: press \leq or > to choose Low, Mid, or High.
 - Backlight Idle: press \triangleleft or \triangleright to choose Off, Low, Mid, or High.
 - **Timeout**: press \triangleleft or \triangleright to choose the backlight timeout (in seconds).
 - Screensaver: press \triangleleft or \triangleright to choose Off, On (1 min), or On (2 min).
 - Call Power Save : press < or > to choose Disabled or Enabled.
 - **Theme**: press or to choose a display theme.
- 6. Press **Set** to save, or press **Back** to cancel.

Setting the keypad light

- 1. Press the **MENU/Confirm** key.
- 2. Press ✓ and ➤ to select ❤️ (Settings), then press **OK**.
- 3. Press \wedge or \vee to scroll to **User settings**, and press **Enter**.
- 4. Press ∧ or ∨ to scroll to **Keypad light,** and press **Enter**.
- 5. Press \triangleleft or \triangleleft to choose Disabled or Enabled.
- 6. Press **Set** to save, or press **Back** to cancel.





Setting Silent Mode

If Silent Mode is enabled:

- The handset will not play the sounds of the ringer, confirmation tone, notification tone, key tone, and end of list tone.

Setting the advisory tones

You can enable or disable the advisory tones the handset makes when the battery is low, the link to the base is lost, and when you press a key on the handset.





Use an Internet web browser to access the Web User Interface (WebUI) that resides on your base station. After you log on to the WebUI, you can configure the following features:

- Base Preferences
- User Preferences
- Base Directory
- Blocked List
- Remote XML directory
- User Password

The WebUI also has a System Status, Cordless Registrations, Cordless status and Base status page, where you can view network status and registration information about your handsets.

How to identify the IP address of the base station

You need to know the IP address of the base station in order to access the WebUI. In a dual cell configuration, each base station has its own IP address. This section describes how to identify the IP address of an M500 base station.

 On a handset/deskset registered to the base station, press the MENU/Confirm key.

The Main Menu appears.

NOTE: If you do not have any handsets/desksets registered to the base station, you can register a handset/deskset. Follow the instructions in "Manually registering via the LINK key on base station" on page 26.

- 2. Press \checkmark and \gt to select \bigcirc (Settings), and then press **OK**.
- 3. With **Status** highlighted, press **Enter**.
- 4. With Network highlighted, press Enter.
- 5. Select the desired network protocol, **IPv4** or **IPv6** and then press **Enter**. The IPv4 or IPv6 screen appears:




- 7. On your computer, open an Internet web browser.

8. Type the **IP address** from step 6 in the web browser address bar and press ENTER on your computer keyboard:

A Login window appears.

- 9. For the Username, enter user.
- Enter the **Password** (default is **user**).
 You can change the password after you sign in.
- 11. Click Sign in.
- 12. On the left sidebar of the web page, click **Status**, and then click **Base Status**. The Base Status page appears.
- 13. If you see a **Mode** column, it indicates the base station's mode in a dual cell configuration. Look up the base station's **Mode** to find its corresponding IP address in the **IP** column. Use this IP address to access the WebUI. See "Accessing the WebUI" on page 71.

In the example below, the Primary base station's IP address is 10.91.20.11 and the Secondary base station's IP address is 10.91.20.109.



14. If you do not see a **Mode** column, it indicates a single cell configuration. The **IP** column shows the base station's IP address (which matches the IP address displayed on the handset/deskset). Use this IP address to access the WebUI. However, at this point you have already accessed the WebUI (in Step 8).



For your security, the WebUI times out after 10 minutes, so if it is idle for that time, you must log on again.



System Status

The System Status page shows:



The System Status page has no settings that you can change. You may need some of the status information for troubleshooting purposes.




Cordless Registrations

The Cordless Registrations page enables you to register and deregister handsets/desksets. It also displays a list of registration status, IPEI and firmware.

The Cordless Status page shows the handset name, IPEI and firmware for your handsets. It also shows to which M500 base each handset is localized.



The Cordless Status page has no settings that you can change. You may need some of the status information for troubleshooting purposes.






Base Directory

To view the base directory, click **CONTACTS** in the WebUI sidebar, and then click **Base directory**.

On the Base directory page, you can manage your base directory entries. You can sort, edit, delete, and add contact information for up to 1,000 entries. The page also allows you to export your phone's base directory or import a base directory file. The export function lets you back up your contacts to your computer.

The Base directory lists entries across several pages. Click **Next**, **First**, **Last**, or a page number to view the desired page of entries.


Remote XML

Troubleshooting

If you have difficulty with your handset, please try the suggestions below.

General issues

Handset does not work at all (LCD is black)

- Confirm the battery is installed and charged correctly.
- Place the handset into it's charger. Ensure the charger is securely plugged into an outlet not controlled by a wall switch.
- If the battery is completely depleted, it can take up to 10 minutes to charge the battery before the low battery icon displays on screen.

My caller ID isn't working.

- Caller ID is a subscription service. Your telephone service provider may require subscription to this service for this feature to work.
- The caller must be calling from an area that supports caller ID.
- Both your telephone service provider and your caller's service provider must use caller ID compatible equipment.

Handset registration is not working

Ensure the handset is within range of the base station.

Cannot make external calls

• Check if your SIP account is registered. Press **MENU/Confirm** key →



Check that the status is (registered).

You might be out of range of the base station. Try moving closer. If you see an
idle screen with no alerts, then your handset is successfully communicating
with the base station.

Handset does not receive incoming calls

- Ensure that Do Not Disturb and Call Forward All are turned off.
- Check if your SIP account is registered. Press **MENU/Confirm** key →

(Settings) **Status** \rightarrow **Line** and select an account.

Check that the status is (registered).

You might be out of range of the base station. Try moving closer.

Poor audio quality. Speech is cutting out.

- You may be close to being out of range of the base station. Try moving closer.
- Other electronic products can cause interference with your handset.
 Try installing the base station far away from devices such as TVs, microwaves, or other cordless devices, including other handsets.
- If the problem persists, contact your system administrator.

Maintenance

Taking care of your telephone

- Your base station and cordless handset contain sophisticated electronic parts, so you must treat them with care.
- Avoid rough treatment.
- Place the handset down gently.
- Save the original packing materials to protect your products if you ever need to ship them.

Avoid water

 You can damage your cordless telephone if it gets wet. Do not use the handset in the rain, or handle it with wet hands. Do not install the base station and handset near a sink, bathtub or shower.

Electrical storms

 Electrical storms can sometimes cause power surges harmful to electronic equipment. For your own safety, take caution when using electric appliances during storms.

Cleaning your telephone

- Your products have a durable plastic casing that should retain its luster for many years. Clean it only with a soft cloth slightly dampened with water or a mild soap.
- Do not use excess water or cleaning solvents of any kind.

Remember that electrical appliances can cause serious injury if used when you are wet or standing in water. If the telephone base should fall into water, DO NOT RETRIEVE IT UNTIL YOU UNPLUG THE POWER CORD FROM THE WALL, then pull the unit out by the unplugged cord.
